June 28 Ski Trips Sign-Up Meeting Kicks Off Our 67th Year of Skiing













It's been one month since our Trip's Sign-Up Event, and your Board is hard at work! This summer, in addition to Z's Saturday bike rides, Eldonna & Patty have added some nature walks. Check out the event calendar for details on the bike rides, the walks, and our summer concert dates.

I want to extend a special thank you to Ray Battey for sponsoring us at the Hillcrest Country Club. His time and dedication to the club is well noted. We had 75 members attend the sign-up this year. We've heard great things from all of you about the facility, the food, and the organization of the event, and feel we are getting the hang of our new



"numbering" system. However, there is still room for improvement, and the Board continues to evaluate areas where we can do better. Look for more improvements next year.

By the end of the day, we had sold 113 spaces for this year's trips. If you are interested, 51% of our skiers take only one trip, and 49% of our skier's ski multiple trips. I just banged out a long article for the next Boomer, because Randy sent me an email reminding me. At seven AM, I am not in a very good mood until the fourth cup of Colombian elixir kicks in. At that point, I would consider something akin to work. But before that magic moment, I am a curmudgeon. Don't expect me to be nice. So I spewed venom in 800 words.

That article was full of gloom and doom, about how climate change and wildfire will eventually kill skiing in the good ol' US of A. And it will. But I'll save that article, revise it a tad, and run it in my monthly column in the local newspaper. Maybe during ski season. That'll make a lot of people happy. I can expect the chamber of commerce and the resort management will come down pretty hard on me. To quote my Scottish grandfather.... "Scroom!" (say it with a Scottish accent, in two syllables.. got it?)

Living here for 15 years has taught us a few things... and I'll share them with you, in case you're thinking of pulling up stakes in the flat lands and moving to high ground.

One.... Have a big bank account. I'm paying a guy 50 bucks an hour to freaking mow my grass! Even adjusted for inflation, the 50 CENTS I earned 60 years ago wouldn't be fifty bucks!
